FLATTENING THE CURVE— FOR A WHILE




After "flattening the curve," cases begin to skyrocket again as states "reopen" in different phases. Researchers continue to race to identify treatments and make vaccines.

Tracking COVID-19 in San Mateo County



Recovery Planning and Reopening

Continuity of instruction and essential support services necessary to support courses are highly susceptible to in-person disruption based on unpredictable and volatile COVID-19 exposures and subsequent applied health and safety procedures. Instructional programs, courses, and support services also require robust preplanning and physical space assessments to be completed prior to publishing course schedules. Timeline requirements for schedule publishing require a nuanced continuity of instruction plan. In-person instruction and essential support services necessary to support courses will continue to be prioritized based on essential worker training, difficult to teach remote courses, or difficult to remotely provide essential support services.

- Comparing Spring semester enrollment pre-COVID 19 to the current Spring 2021 semester, regular (non K-12) resident students and international students saw a continued decline of more than double the previous academic year.
- ▶ The COVID 19 has had its most dramatic impact on International and Low Income student enrollment.

Student Enrollment During COVID-19



Similar to the Spring semester comparisons, the Fall 2020 semester saw a decline in both headcount and enrollment of students, with the exception of Dual/Concurrent Enrollment, with the most significant declines seen in International and Low Income students.

Similar to the impacts on enrollment, the COVID 19 pandemic has contributed to decreases in term-to-term persistence.

Student Success during COVID-19



- Overall, course success rates during the COVID-19 pandemic have not changed substantially from previous terms.
- While there are differences that exist between and among different groups of students regarding overall course success rates, these differences are not unique to the experience of students in the COVID-19 pandemic.


Continuity of Instruction: In-person Instruction






Student Survey Responses April 2021 (n = 3,338)




Given that Skyline, Cañada and CSM are planning to remain mostly online in Fall 2021, what is your current plan for the Fall 2021 semester?

Student's current plan for the Fall 2021 semester





Student's preferred in-person student services






Student's comfort level regarding in-person student services








Although overall, 61% of students expressed comfort with accessing in-person student services, this level varied depending on student demographics.


Q7 - What conditions would make you feel more comfortable about using inperson student services in Fall 2021? Please choose up to 3 top factors.

Conditions that would help students not comfortable with in-person student services






Student's vaccination status by start of Fall 2021




Prefer not to answer (5%, 140)

OTHER SERVICES OR ACTIVITIES OUTSIDE OF INSTRUCTION & ESSENTIAL SUPPORT SERVICES

Services and activities that are outside of instruction and essential support services will be considered based on California's Blueprint for a Safer Economy tier system and San Mateo County's guidance. District priority for instruction and essential services supporting instruction, as well as other priority operation commitments, will be factored into a final determination.

While restrictions cannot be predicted at any given time, approved events will take place based on the current conditions outlined by the recovery tier at the time of the scheduled event. Continual tier assessment will occur through the Emergency Manager and Emergency Operation Center team. Event leads will be contacted as soon as possible if an event cannot be conducted due to tier system or other restrictions. Given the uncertainty of these potential restrictions, the District will honor.

Recovery and Reopening



Reopening Plan for Summer 2021

Instructional and student support programs will continue to operate mainly in a remote and online modality for the Summer 2021 term. The prioritized programs described above, as well as other essential District and College services, will continue to operate onsite. In addition, with the expectation that the State will move beyond the Blueprint for a Safer Economy on June 15, 2021, employees who are fully vaccinated will be allowed to access their office space and work on-campus, with the approval of their supervisor, after June 15th. Any employees who have not been regularly working on-campus prior to June 15th must demonstrate proof of vaccination against COVID-19 in order to access their office or workspace. Working on campus for non-essential employees will be voluntary for the Summer semester.

Recovery and Reopening



Reopening Plan for Fall 2021

In-person instruction will expand to include "Hard to Deliver Online" courses in addition to courses that have been delivered in-person in previous semesters. Student support services, programs, and business operations will return on-campus with approval by the SMCCCD Emergency Operations Center (EOC), following State and San Mateo County guidance and health orders. Supervisors will be responsible for creating a health and safety proposal for operating their programs or services on site and in-person. The Chancellor is recommending to the Board that ALL EMPLOYESS working on site or accessing campus will be required to be fully vaccinated by July 31, 2021. As of August 1, management and administration will be expected to be on-site regularly at the college campuses and in district offices.

Recovery and Reopening



Reopening Plan for Spring 2022

All District operations, including student support services, in-person instruction, programs, and business operations will operate face-to-face on the campuses and at the District Office. Employees will be expected to work on campus. In order to support these operations, the Chancellor is recommending to the Board that all employees and students be required to demonstrate proof of vaccination against COVID-19 beginning January 3, 2022. Contact tracing and some health and safety precautions will remain in place such as required vaccinations, periodic testing of some personnel, and contact tracing capability. Campuses will strive to have onsite vaccination capability in order to support long-term operations.

Policy Recommendations



- Employees working on site or accessing District sites after July 31, 2021 be required to have a vaccination against COVID-19, unless otherwise exempted under California state law. Employees who are exempted from the vaccination requirement, and will be working onsite or accessing campus, will be required to engage in weekly COVID-19 surveillance testing.
- Students enrolled at any of the colleges of the District on or after January 3, 2022 be required to have a vaccination against COVID-19 unless otherwise exempted under California state law. Students who are exempted from the vaccination requirement and will be accessing campus, will be required to engage in weekly COVID-19 surveillance testing.
- Assuming the above vaccination mandates and no other external restrictions in either the State of California or County of San Mateo, <u>all District operations will be open onsite and in-person</u>, <u>including the regular scheduling of in-person instruction, student support services, programs, and business operations, beginning January 3, 2022.</u>

Other Considerations



- Guidance will be changing regarding requirements for PPE/face coverings, social distancing, contract tracing, indoor operations, and sanitization.
 - Cal-OSHA is expected to revise their guidance during the month of May 2021.
 - ▶ These changes may impact District operations in unknown and unpredictable ways.
- ▶ With the onset of an already severe drought season, any requirement to maintain open windows or doors for air circulation as part of COVID response measures will increase disruption to District operations when the Air Quality Index (AQI) is high as a result of smoke from wildfires. Power outages may also impact operations.
- We are currently working under negotiated MOUs with our bargaining units that will need to be extended through the end of the Fall semester based on policy decisions that impact those groups.
