SMCCCD Poor Air Quality Plan Overview



PURPOSE

Defines procedures for degraded air quality incidents.



WHO IT PROTECTS

Students, faculty, staff, and campus visitors.



HAZARDS COVERED

Wildfire smoke and regional air pollution.



WHAT THE PLAN COVERS

Protective actions, communications, and operational adjustments.



TRAINING POINT: This annex helps the District respond quickly and consistently during poor air quality events.

How SMCCCD tracks air quality conditions



WHO MONITORS?

- Air monitoring is led by Public Safety and/or Emergency Management.
- District conditions are monitored regularly.

AirNow



IQAir



PurpleAir

- ✓ AirNow is EPA-accepted; SMCCCD also uses local IQAir and PurpleAir data to improve coverage.



DISTRICT MONITORING

- SMCCCD maintains one PurpleAir monitor on each campus.
- Local readings help supplement limited regional monitor coverage.

THE RELATIVE SIZE OF PARTICLES

From the COVID-19 pandemic to the U.S. West Coast wildfires, some of the biggest threats now are also the most microscopic.

A particle needs to be 10 microns (μm) or less before it can be inhaled into your respiratory tract. But just how small are these specks?



Particles **10 μm or smaller** can be inhaled into the respiratory tract.



The visibility limits for what the naked eye can see hover around **10–40 μm** .



Wildfire smoke can persist in the air for several days, and even months.

Cross-functional team mobilized to assess and manage the situation.

Air Quality Index Chart

AQI COLOR	LEVEL OF CONCERN	AQI RANGE	DESCRIPTION
 Green	Good	0–50	 Air quality is satisfactory and poses little or no risk.
 Yellow	Moderate	51–100	 Air quality is acceptable, though some people unusually sensitive to air pollution may be affected.
 Orange	Unhealthy for Sensitive Groups	101–150	 Sensitive groups may experience health effects; the general public is less likely to be affected.
 Red	Unhealthy	151–200	 Some members of the general public may experience health effects; sensitive groups may experience more serious health effects.
 Purple	Very Unhealthy	201–300	 Health alert; the risk of health effects increases for everyone.
 Maroon	Hazardous	301–500	 Health warning of emergency conditions; everyone is more likely to be affected.

Unusually sensitive people:

Consider reducing prolonged or heavy exertion. Watch for symptoms such as coughing or shortness of breath. These are signs to take it a little easier.

HOW WE COMMUNICATE AIR QUALITY ORANGE CONDITIONS (101–150)

When the Air Quality Index (AQI) reaches the Orange range (101–150), we take immediate steps to inform our campus community.

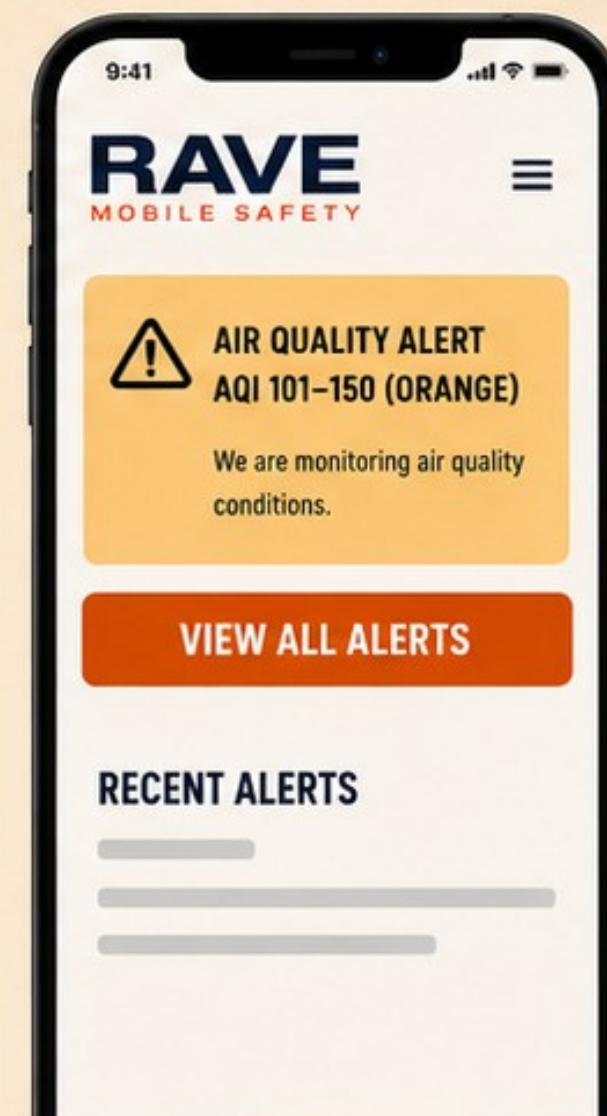

UNHEALTHY

1 ACTIVATE CAT



- Convene CAT
- Include PIO, Public Safety, Facilities, OEM, HR, IT, Instruction

2 USE DECISION WINDOWS

PERIOD	START	END
 Morning	9:00 AM	9:00 PM
 Afternoon	7:00 AM	6:00 PM
 Evening	11:00 AM	12:00 PM

3 OUTDOOR ACTIVITY



- Consider modifying or relocating outdoor classes, practices, athletic competitions, recreation programs, and ceremonies.
- Consider postponing, suspending or cancelling activities.
- Decision windows should consider current AQI conditions, forecast trends, duration of exposure, and operational impact.

4 RELOCATE TO CLEANER AIR



- Move classes / work from unfiltered to filtered spaces
- Use pre-planned smoke refuge sites
- Send relocation notices through RAVE

5 PROTECT ESSENTIAL SERVICES



- Use engineering controls first
- Adjust work schedules / identify if needed
- N95 is minimum recommended protection
- Send RAVE message by email



TRAINING POINT:

Red conditions require leadership coordination, decision windows, indoor relocation, and strong protection for outdoor and essential operations.

CONSIDER PAUSING INSTRUCTION & NON-ESSENTIAL FUNCTIONS

- Chancellor/President may discontinue operations.
- Allow for site differences and safe shutdowns.
- Consider special circumstances such as labs, exams, and time-sensitive work.

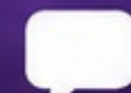

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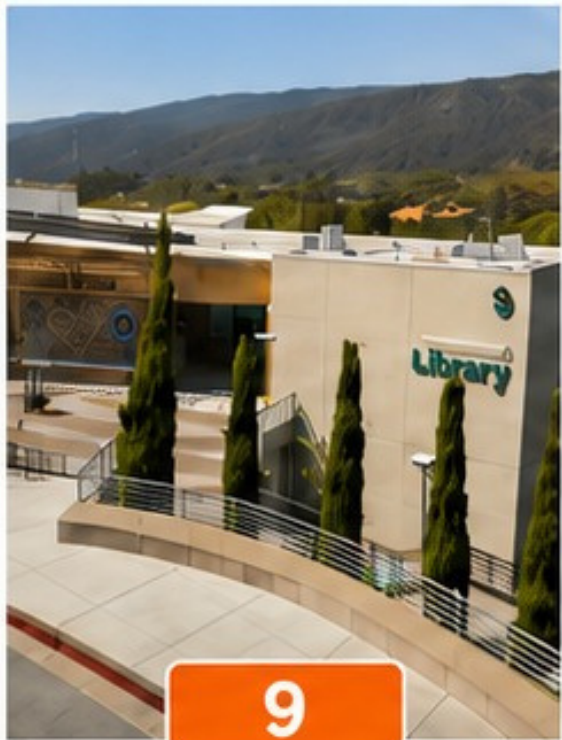
BEST SMOKE REFUGE BUILDINGS

These buildings offer the best protection from smoke during emergencies due to their safety features and locations.

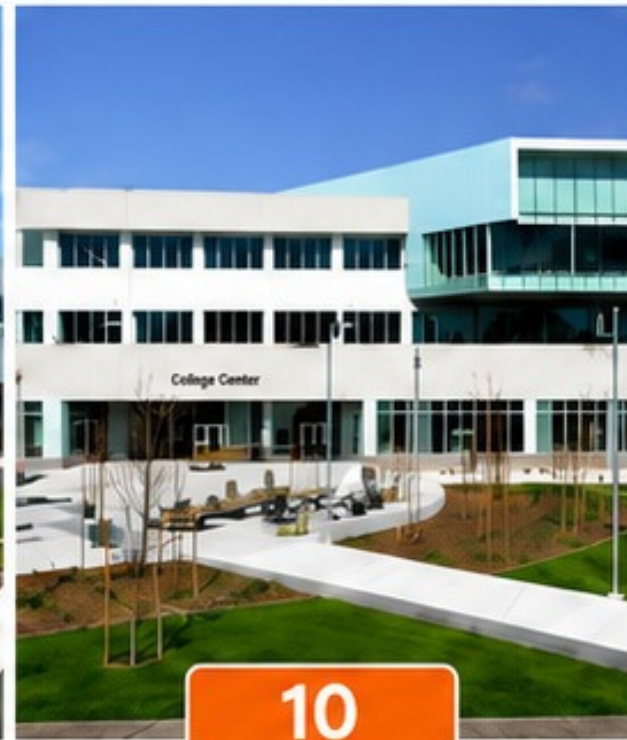
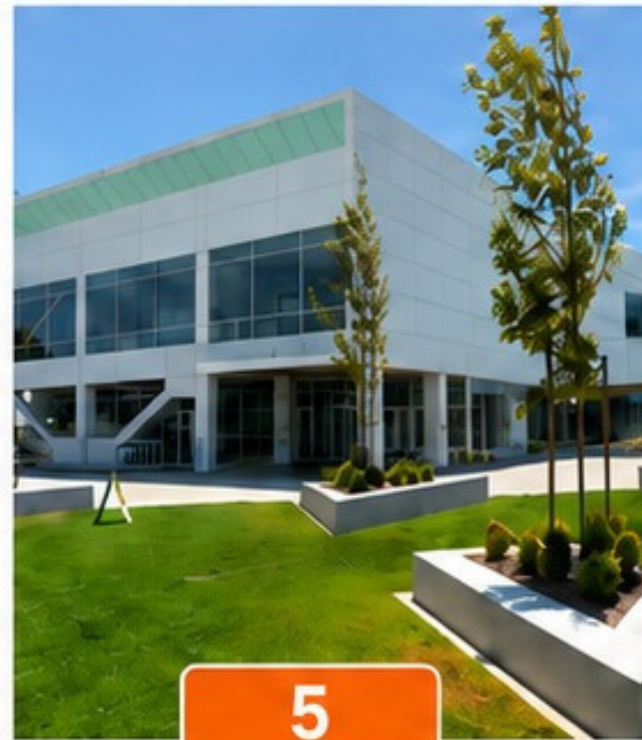

- ✓ Strong building construction

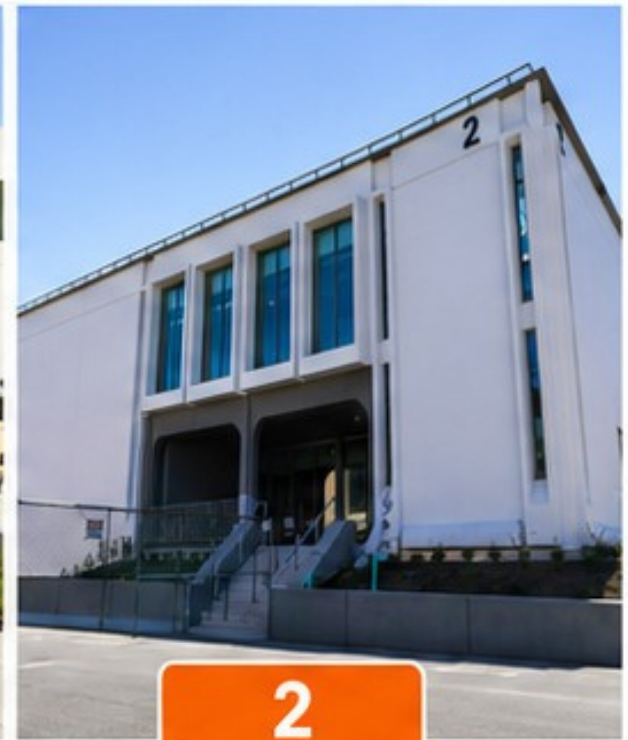
COLLEGE OF SAN MATEO
